APPENDIX B: IDEAS FOR GENERAL QUESTIONS

Students should brainstorm as many questions as possible that could be asked to any group member. These questions are 'back-up' options if a student cannot think of a question 'on the spot'. The process is valuable practice with question formation and grammar which could be reviewed and highlighted as necessary. Below are some ideas. This is, of course, not a comprehensive list, and teachers can adapt the list however they choose. For example, instead of a brainstorm activity from scratch, a teacher could provide a gap-fill activity, some question prompts, or just some key words.

- d. Do you think presentations are important for students to practice? Why? Why not?

- g. Have you ever done a presentation before? When? How long was it?
- h. Do you prefer to present by yourself, or in a group? Why?
- i. What advice would you give to another student about doing a presentation?
- i. What do you want to improve next time you do a presentation?
- k. Why did you choose this topic?
- 1. How did you research the topic?
- m. Who prepared the PowerPoint slides?
- n. Which do you prefer, doing a presentation or writing an essay? Why?
- o. Did your group work well together? Why?
- p. What was the most interesting part of your group's presentation?
- q. Did you learn anything new while preparing your presentation?
